Fundraising to Music

On November 19th, about 80 people watched our local band, Stonefish, play at the Community Center. The building was transformed into an intimate theater that reminded me of the set of



MTVs Unplugged. The Flex room showed off its versatility as it became the Green Room for the Band. Our Local winemaker, Doug Roosevelt of Sonoma 980, donated wine and kept the glasses full all night! The sold-out show netted \$2,400 for the remodel and was another fun way for people to give back to the community. A huge thanks to Stonefish for playing, Doug for serving and to the Social Club who organized the night!

Cell Tower

The board liaison to Verizon and San Domenico reports that the parties to the cell phone tower site lease have completed a Phase I environmental review and expect to have an updated and executed lease agreement and zoning filing by early December. The delay has been due to a discrepancy in the ownership name between the lease, title documents, and the W9 for rent payment. The original Verizon Phase 1 environmental review expired. That is currently being



updated, and should be complete by the end of November. Once that is complete, Verizon can route the agreement for Verizon's signature, which should not take more than a week. Once this step is complete, Verizon will start the application process with the County.

Crossing Guards for Safety

Together our community is changing the future of safety on Butterfield.

You probably noticed the traffic survey lines that were laid on Butterfield which collected ~30 days of data and was compared to 4 days of data from 2018. The purpose was to assess safety, utilization and areas of opportunity. So what did the data show? An amazing 5968 vehicles/day. FYI: 26 more than in 2018/pre COVID = not meaningful. The average speed is 32MPH which is 3MPH less than 2018 and 95% of drivers are within 5% of the 30 MPH speed limit. Nice work!

But why do these numbers matter? With the high volume of vehicles coupled with nearly 1300 students between all schools we are raising the bar to keep safety a priority. We have a relatively good safety record but let's not forget

the death of a woman in 2019, other minor injuries and of course unreported injuries. There have been many independent efforts for safety such as the SHHA hiring a cross guard during busy events, flags put at crosswalks and areas of crossing thanks to Debbie and the Girl Scouts for adding reflective tape, sandwich board in the middle of Butterfield to slow traffic during swim and many others doing their best to contribute. We know there is opportunity to keep our community safer and we're asking for your support.

SHHA Safety Committee is working closely with residents, supervisor Katie Rice's team

News & Notes from Supervisor Katie Rice

Free Speech

If you have traveled along Butterfield on any recent weekend morning you likely noticed a woman dressed in black, adorned with a white signboard, standing by the side of the road, within the public right of way, her back to the street, front/face fixed on the house at 961 Butterfield Road. Those who have stopped and enquired per the purpose of her weekend vigils may have learned that her protest is aimed squarely at me and primarily relates to a new traffic signal pole located on one corner of a busy intersection adjacent to her home Sir Francis Drake Blvd. across from Bon Air Shopping Center.

This traffic signal light pole (along with others at the intersection) replaces the original signal light poles as part of the Upgrade the Drake project. It is larger, taller, and in a different location than the original poles. It's size and placement are dictated by traffic code and by the intersection's configuration,

The protester blames me for the siting of the pole, for the visual impact and audible intrusion of noise (emitted when the "walk" button is triggered) she experiences from her home due to its location. She believes the changes to the intersection, this signal light pole specifically, have affected the value of her home and property.

My office has engaged with her. I have spoken with her. I have had our traffic engineers meet with her on site to explain the siting of the pole, the code dictating placement and size, as well as ADA requirements with regards to the "walk" audible. I have had the engineers assess if there is reasonable way to eliminate or mitigate the pole issue. There is not.

The "cure" for her issue is one I cannot deliver. I have told her this. The engineers have told her this.

She has said that she will continue to protest outside my home until the pole is moved. The right to peacefully protest and share one's grievances with government by sig-

one's grievances with government by signage or handouts or through conversation is protected under both the Constitution of the United States and the Constitution of the State of California.

As someone serving in public office, I understand the potential for having people protest at my personal residence. It's only happened once before and lasted a few hours one afternoon. That said, I feel badly for my

neighbors and to the community at large for any disruption or discomfort a protest of any kind may cause.

So, I write today to explain the circumstances with regards to the current situation, to apologize, and to express my thanks to the entire community for understanding the importance of our right to free speech and peaceful protest. I will continue to treat any protester outside my home with courtesy and respect. I will seek to understand their grievance, and to the degree that I can address it, I will.

1. Crosswalk to the community center. The Community Center hosts ~57,000 people (visitors)/year at the pool. With social events, exercise classes, Cub Scouts and many more activities which have continued to grow as the SHHA Community Center nears completion, we estimate that around 75,000 people (visitors) and families are crossing with no protection in an undesignated area of the road, no street lights and with cars traveling at +30MPH. This is where a cross walk would safely allow a designated path to cross for pedestrians and keeping drivers safe by knowing where to be

2. Clearly designated bike/walk/ scoot/skate/roll lane. Butterfield has wide shoulders in which many use as a green way to travel/activities. In fact, over 150 bikers per day! Unfortunately, the shoulder is not designated as such and when cars are parked on the shoulder, it becomes an immediate hazard to walkers/bikers and the vehicles who are traveling along Butterfield to have to immediately respond to those individuals who sometimes veer into the street putting all at risk. Please realize that not all bikers are experienced and the schools encourage green ways to school so it's complicated and many families don't feel this is a safe option.

on the lookout for crossings.



- Bryant Bedwell, Treasurer Nominations in addition to the proposed slate may, per the SHHA by-laws, be made up until January 3, by a written petition signed by 3% of the SHHA household memberships, or 12 household memberships in good standing with dues paid for the 2021 membership year. All nominees must be members in good standing of the SHHA. Each household paying dues is a Membership. Each membership is entitled to up to 2 votes at the annual meeting. Members must



be present to vote.

In addition to the Director and Officer roles, there are opportunities for project leadership and numerous other volunteer needs. In particular, we seek members interested in two important roles to help keep the Sleepy Hollow Community Center active and running smoothly: 1) Calendar Manager to log in events offered by the SHHA, meetings scheduled, and private events, as well as cleaning schedules; and 2) Volunteer Coordinator, to schedule and help recruit and guide residents to serve as greeters at the Community Center during open hours when members and residents can drop in for casual gathering, coffee, internet, television, cards, or just waiting for a child at swim practice.

'Tis the Season...Please Give Now So We Have More Winter Construction

Your community has raised \$343,000 in donations, pledges, and private loans, putting us at 56% of our goal for Phase 2 construction. The willingness of the private lenders to put their money in for winter work is allowing us to be underway toward all new locker room/bath rooms and outdoor showers in time for 2022 swim season. And it puts us in reach of having a play area now as well. Construction of the play area is probably not feasible during s wim season, so...

Let's get the play area built. With an estimated \$50,000 more pledged now and paid now or by March 31, 2022, we could also have a play area for summer 2022. Design is in process and led by Caroline Bruister, who has been active in the Sleepy Hollow Social Club and is nominated to the SHHA Board for 2022. She is building on the good work of the team led by Aya Andrews with strong early support from Emily Baker, Jeff Gates, Hayley Mullen, and Lauren Thornhill. Get involved and stay up to date on emerging designs at shha.org/communitycenter.

Hard on the heels of play area funding comes the promise of more Phase 2 benefits to the community, through projects that have a more flexible window for construction, avoiding negative impact on Sea Lions and Family Swim seasons:

Acoustic divider will enable more and better use of our new spaces. Think of classes or meetings in the Legends Room while members and residents enjoy casual gathering in the Founders Room or Porch Library.


Emergency supplies storage for the SHFPD is a pillar of the dual use facility we have created. The flex room space provides ample square footage for the supplies and terms of the lease, but impacts other potential uses of the flex space. Many are looking forward to using the flex space as a work out gym when we can build the separate storage building.

Outdoor fire feature, new outdoor and pool furniture and umbrellas

None of this would exist or be happening without the steady support of Sleepy Hollow people, who worked and gave over more than ten years to bring the vision to life. Cumulative community giving now exceeds \$1,400,000 and has enabled completion of over \$1,800,000 in improvements to the Sleepy Hollow Community Center and the beginning of locker room renovation. All donors,

320+ and counting, will be recognized permanently in the Community Center at the conclusion of Phase 2. Attendees: Spencer Adams, Dave Baker, Aya Andrews, Erik Ruud, Jan Blackford, Pete Mayer, Hayley Mullen, Annie Winship Cell Tower Update: No call back from Verizon. After multiple attempts, Pete reached out to Katie Rice. She is following up with her contacts. Verizon needs to submit the application to Marin County for review and approval.

Butterfield Safety: The Board decided to create a committee to work with San Domenico on multiple issues, like Butterfield Safety and the funds from the traffic agreement. The committee will be Pete Mayer, Gina Singleton and Spencer Adams. Marin County has completed its vehicle count program for Butterfield. We are awaiting the results. Vehicle counts are the first step towards developing a safety improvement plan for the Butterfield corridor.

Budget: Jan Blackford is working on the budget for next year. She needs membership projections from Hayley. Membership dues for both SHHA and Friends of Sleepy Hollow will increase in order to support the operational costs of the SHHA.

Events and Activities: Aya is trying out a new process for selling fitness class access. The current system is not easy for members. If this new process doesn't meet our needs we will look into a new scheduling and payment platform. November has multiple events for the community including a game night for middle school kids and an Evening with Stonefish, which is a fundraising for the Community Center remodel.

Pool: We need more lifeguards for the next swim season. The lifeguard shortage affected us and we couldn't keep the pool open as long as we had planned. SHHA will start recruitment earlier next year and consider increasing wages to attract employees.

Fundraising: Fundraising is going well. SHCF has approximately \$126,000 in payments and verbal commits and \$150,000 in private lending committed.

Construction: Bathrooms, locker rooms and outdoor shower construction is starting in November. Bathrooms and Locker rooms should be completed in February. Outdoor showers should be completed by end of March. The Playground, CERT Storage and fireplace projects will start after the current bathroom/locker room remodel is complete. These projects are also dependent on how much money we raise.

Board Nominations: We discussed the nominations of Caroline Bruister, Bryant Bedwell and Diane Fiddyment. We are finishing interviews and hope to have them completed in two weeks.

Membership: Dues will be increased for next year. We are finalizing the numbers and will have that complete by mid-December. The renewal drive will start in January.

SHFPD ACCOMPLISHMENTS 2021

Sleepy Hollow Fire Protection District

2021 was a busy year for the Sleepy Hollow Fire Protection District (SHF-PD). Our mission is to safeguard our community through the delivery of professional, efficient, and effective services protecting life, property, and the environment. Most of our budget is used to support fire suppression and emergency medical services (\$1,283,565). SHFPD directors Rich Shortall and Tom Finn represent Sleepy Hollow as voting members of the Ross Valley Fire Department Joint Powers Authority Board of Directors. Tom is also a director of the Ross Valley Paramedic Authority.

The SHFPD supports several programs that reduce the risk and hazard of wildfire in our community. The District established the Hazardous Vegetation Removal Grant Program to encourage Sleepy Hollow residents to create and maintain defensible space around their homes. The grant provided up to \$3000 for removal of hazardous species of plants. The program is still accepting applications http://www.shfpd.org/grants. The District, with support from the Marin Wildfire Prevention Authority, provided five opportunities for residents to remove flammable vegetation through curbside and dropoff chipper events. Large scale projects included the maintenance of fuel breaks and defensible space using goat grazing to reduce flammable vegetation along the Sleepy Hollow ridge tops and behind homes. Additional fuel break projects were completed at the San Domenico School and the Triple C Ranch.

The SHFPD became one of the first National Fire Protection Association recognized Firewise communities in Marin. Neighbors helping neighbors—this is what Firewise USA* is all about. Residents join together as a Firewise site and take actions to prepare themselves, their homes and their properties against the threat of wildfire. They look out for one another and provide those in need of assistance with help in emergency preparation. Our block captain program supports the Firewise program by having local leaders provide safety information and support to Sleepy Hollow residents. The District has provided most of the block captains with satellite phones that can be used to contact 911 if local communications are out. You can find a map with the addresses here http://www.shfpd.org/satellite-phones. Our block captains are also responsible to help organize the annual evacuation drill. Please contact Sharon Adams if you are interested in helping with the program.

The new SHFPD office in the Sleepy Hollow Community Center is now almost complete. The office has several emergency communication systems including a high end satellite phone, Marin Emergency Radio Authority scanner, ham radio connection to the Marin Office of Emergency Services, and a local radio network for emergency communications within Sleepy Hollow. When construction is complete, we expect to have regular office hours open to the residents on weekends. The District has also funded fire smart demonstration landscaping for the site. When complete, there will be many varied and attractive examples of wildfire resistant plantings to improve the safety of your homes. The SHFPD has again set up the nearby sandbag station for residents.

The District will continue to provide wildfire safety and other disaster related information to our residents through this newsletter, our website and the block captain program. We strongly encourage residents to visit the Fire Safe Marin website and Youtube channel and to subscribe to their various social media for the latest wildfire safety news and information. The District will continue to host regular viewings at the Club House of their new streaming program called Wildfire Watch. The host and guests that appear on the program will be on hand for discussion with the attendees. 
CAMPUS STATUS Thank you for your collaboration in best protecting our communal health during this historic pandemic. With
