Community Center Renovation Plans Moving Forward

The design approval amendment is being reviewed in the County Planning Department. Several contractors are reviewing the design approval amendment materials now. The submittal to County Planning is a matter of public record and is posted on the Community Center page of shha.org. We could have a response in August, or it could be later. Engineers are at work on design development that will enable an updated independent cost estimate and allow general contractors to evaluate the project more closely. By mid- to late-August we expect to have the independent cost estimate and preliminary bids from contractors that may include cost-saving suggestions.

We will share what we know at that point, preview the path forward including project budget and fundraising plan, and seek your input. November is still a possible start date, a month behind our most optimistic benchmarks for

starting in October, mostly because it took more time to work out site plan issues for a complete submittal to County Planning.

We are on the path described in June — planning for what the community wants and needs, and only building what we can afford. If costs increase, we will trim and prioritize and review with the community before completing bidding and permitting. We also are looking at funding beyond the amount we need to raise within the community, such as grants for solar power and battery back-up, materials and volunteer labor for non-technical work such as the CERT storage, volunteer guidance for audio visual and other special features.

Your donations and gifts in fulfillment of pledges are still very important. When we have a clear cost, path, and updated timelines for the renovation, we will ask for your support. Send your questions or ideas to shhapresident@gmail.com and I or Jan Blackford, President of the SHCF, will respond.

Wildfire Prevention Must Be a Communitywide Effort

Great to see all the piles of brush and branches neatly assembled along neighborhood streets awaiting pick up/chip up for most recent Sleepy Hollow Fire District sponsored Chipper Day weekend. A huge "hats off" to everyone for stepping up per their own property, and applause and thanks to Sleepy Hollow Fire District board members, Rich Shortall, Tom Finn and Sharon Adams for your leadership in guiding this effort

We are extremely fortunate here in the Hollow to have such an active, forward leaning organization not only leading/supporting our own community wildfire prevention work, but also leading and modeling community preparedness and cross agency partnership and collaboration throughout Marin.

Partnering and collaboration are key strategies of much of the work happening here in the Hollow and in greater Marin. Lessons learned from the 2017 North Bay fire and other recent fires make it clear that wildfire does not recognize jurisdictional boundaries. Hence the need for local government, fire agencies, communities across Marin to work together as we take on our wildfire challenge. It has been gratifying to see the level of cooperation, planning and commitment to work together now being exhibited in Marin. By way of example:

This spring a cross jurisdictional, multi-fire agency partnership led by FIRESafe MARIN was awarded a \$1 million-dollar Cal Fire grant to help fund evacuation route clearance and fuel reduction projects in the Ross Valley. The grant provides funding for road-side vegetation work to improve access and egress along more than 55 miles of roads in seven hillside neighborhoods along the east slope of Mt. Tamalpais. The grant will also help fund other wildfire fuel reduction projects prioritized in the 2017 Community Wildfire Protection Plan.

Also launched this year, a two year partnership between Marin County Parks and the Marin County Fire Department that will fund a crew of 14 wildland firefighters for two seasons. Funding (\$2.3 million in Parks/ Measure A funds) for the two-year pro-

Now that you know about homeowner's responsibilities and best practices for creek maintenance, see below for more info on ways to protect your streambank. Rainy season is right around to corner – so please mark October 5 on your calendars for the Sixth Annual Creek Cleaning/Winter Storm Prep and Chipper Station! More info to follow next month.

Creek Care 101! Part 3

Protecting Your Streambank

A majority of creek banks in Marin are subject to erosion, especially those on the outside bend of a stream AND those lacking vegetation such as native riparian trees where the robust root system holds the soil in place, protecting the bank. The best techniques to use, that promote a healthy riparian corridor, include soil bioengineering methods which are considered "soft engineering" that are eco-friendly and nature-based solutions to creek bank erosion. Some examples of these techniques include but are not limited to:

Willow/dogwood staking and sprigging (note: willows prefer sun and dogwoods prefer shade)

Willow/dogwood walls Brush layering*

Willow/dogwood mattress

Laying the bank back to a 2:1 slope then vegetating it with natives*

Using large pieces of wood to deflect flows away from the toe of your bank*



SHHA Informal Meeting Notes, July 11, 2019

7:00 – 8:20 p.m. Scott Hintergardt, Jan Blackford, Spencer Adams, Lorraine Ferrarese.

No resident came to speak at Open Time. We met without a quorum and discussed three items for referral to the SHHA Board.

Scott presented the status of the negotiations with San Domenico, and it was agreed that we should summarize our best and final offer, seek SHHA Board approval for it at the August board meeting, and present it to San Domenico. Jan will summarize our proposal, which includes the willingness to pilot

for 12 months a suspension of audits and penalties for weekend trip limits. The SHHA Board will discuss the potential for an overall pilot as an alternative to our proposal. Spencer shared sample results of software that can identify origin and destination of cell phones moving through selected points. This can be done at a relatively low cost and could be useful in cross checking other data, supporting our positions, or assisting with a pilot.

Scott presented the urgency to replace Steve Knox in his clubhouse manager roles of scheduling events/users for the master calendar, coordinating building rentals, managing the janitor and the landscaper, and ordering basic supplies for the facility. Steve has retired and Jan and Scott are sharing this responsibility now. No one is doing the handy man/building superintendent job Steve filled that saved so much money over the years.

Best result would be to find an adult volunteer in the community willing to take on this role until renovation begins. Estimate 5 hours per week on average. Ask for this prominently in the July Bulletin and by separate email and personal outreach if necessary. Also willing to consider, with pay, a young adult or mature teen, available into the fall up to renovation. High school senior, local college student, or older child living at

home.

Jan reported an incident that day of pool members consuming alcohol at the pool. Guards are trying to enforce but need help. We will remove the large sign which apparently caused some to think that drinking at the pool is ok, and will post a reminder of the longstanding and published rule of no drinking on the pool premises.

(14. Absolutely no intoxicants (beverages or otherwise) on the SHHA pool premises. Individuals having consumed intoxicants may be denied use of the pool and access to the pool premises at the sole discretion of the lifeguard.)

Checking with other current and former Board members after the meeting confirms that the policy has applied to the entire premises, not only the area inside the pool fence.
