Public Comment: Matt Samson, running for water board Division 1 (includes SH) attended and spoke. Shared his experience as Deputy fire chief, wildfire prevention and response focus, and zone haven evacuation project implemented statewide. Wants to apply Emergency planning from fire service to water board, consider more equitable recreational use of watershed and store water underground.

Membership: Hayley reported an increase in SHHA members from 383 to 386 (with 146 senior members vs. 149 prior year), and strong growth in pool

As a long time Sleepy Hollow resident, I want to thank the Sleepy Hollow Safety Committee and the community for embracing a safety

improvement on Butterfield that has been talked about by many for many years - a "real" bike lane! Yes, it's official, we have a signed, striped, official (and enforceable) bike lane running from the San Anselmo/Hollow border to Sleepy Hollow Drive. Kids and adults, walkers and bikers will no longer need to swing out into traffic to get around a car or truck parked on the road shoulder. That said, where there is space available outside of the bike lane-parking is allowed. Just leave the bike lane clear! While having an official bike lane will definitely make travel safer for bikers (and walkers), it also requires additional road striping and no parking signage (at roughly 200-foot intervals to enable enforcement). Several residents have reached out requesting adjustments to sign placement. The County traffic engineer will be working with these neighbors to fine-tune sign locations. The good news is, no objections to the bike lane itself. A true testament to the inclusive community process (survey and community meeting) led by the Safety committee.

The work is ongoing. Green paint will be added at the end of the bike lane (Butterfield/Sleepy Hollow Drive) and other relevant locations, a few sign placements potentially tweaked, and striping will be refined in the future. In addition, a parking

task force (subgroup of the Safety Committee) is looking to assist interested homeowners on Butterfield to create safe, low maintenance and attractive off-street parking in front of their homes. Funding from the SHHA traffic safety fund will be available for costs associated with making parking improvements in the Hidden Valley school zone given the great need for parking in that area. Going forward: The Butterfield Safety committee will be looking into additional safety improvements along the corridor. The committee's goal is to extend the bike lane as far as possible north being mindful of Community Center event parking needs. The committee is also working with the County to implement the crossing at Butterfield/Irving (at the community center). A key element of the Committee's work to date has been extensive outreach and engagement. Keep your eye out for updates in the newsletter, surveys sent to your inbox, and feel free to reach out directly to committee member Gina Singleton (gina.singleton@gilead.com) or my office with any questions, comments, or concerns. RACIST LANGUAGE UNCOVERED IN NEWLY BUILT SLEEPY HOLLOW HOME

When Sleepy Hollow resident Lezley Blair first moved to the neighborhood in 2013, she didn't yet know that her new home was, like many others in the area (see Marin County Recorder's interactive map here: Restrictive Covenants Time Progression /https://bit.ly/MarinRestrictiveCovenantsMap), a site with historic discriminatory language that persisted into the present.

Beginning in 1934, the use of racially restrictive covenants was encouraged by the Federal Housing Authority to prohibit the inclusion of people of color in the housing market and predominantly white areas. Restrictive covenants imposed limitations on who may occupy a purchased property or how it may be used. More specifically, racially restrictive covenants prohibit the occupation, lease, purchase, or other ownership of a property by a specific group of people on the merit of race or ethnicity. Although the covenants were ruled unenforceable by the Supreme Court with the 1968 Fair Housing Act, they still exist on property deeds today.

Since 2021, the County of Marin has supported the efforts of the Restrictive Covenant Project to educate residents on these restrictive covenants and encourage their removal from individual homes in the community. In 2020, Supervisor Katie Rice found racial covenant language in her deed which she had stricken.

Upon purchasing her home in 2013, Lezley was not made aware of the fact that her property deed could be home to a racially restrictive covenant at the time of the real estate transaction. She first heard of the Restrictive Covenant Project via the Marin IJ and the Sleepy Hollow Homeowners Association Bulletin.

"I was aware of the project and assumed it would not be an issue for me because of the relatively new build," said Lezley, making note of the fact that her home was built in 2006, almost 40 years after the passing of the Fair Housing Act. Logically, it would make no sense for the deed to have a covenant because of this.

However after talking with Alex Thomas, a neighborhood representative for the Restrictive Covenant Project, Lezley learned that restrictive covenants were not necessarily imposed on the house itself, but could apply to earlier property deeds. When Lezley looked at section B of her title report, there were four listed covenants that required further investigation at the Marin County Recorder's Office to see if they were racially motivated.

"The restrictive covenant I found was dated 1943. It was a grant deed attached to this property. The racist covenant stated, 'No person or persons not of the Caucasian or white race shall use or occupy the above described land or any part thereof, and the party of the second part does hereby bind itself and its successors in interest to not do any act which will permit or occasion violation of this restriction." Simply put the entire property and its contents were restricted to white ownership and occupation, and all the owners and occupants that followed would have to do the same."

Upon finding the restriction on her property, Lezley underwent the process of having the covenant stricken from the record. In only a handful of steps, she was able to locate her property's

MMWD: Building A Greater Water Supply

October 10, 2022

Even though we continue to suffer through the driest three year period in over 125 years, the Water District reports that our reservoirs are nearly 75% full, which is above average for this time of year. There are two reasons for our current healthy water supply. The first is the unusual rainstorm we experienced last October, a storm which dropped over 11 inches of rain on Mt. Tamalpais in a 24 hour period. The second reason for our currently strong reservoir supply is that we have been using less of our own reservoir water, and using more water from the Russian River. We are currently able to do that because of the infrastructure system improvements the district made (additional pumping and piping) to the system at Kastania Road in Petaluma - the point at which we take water from Sonoma. Those improvements have increased our total water supply, with previously unavailable water, in the amount of almost 5,000 acre feet per year - the equivalent of building a new Bon Tempe Reservoir.

Beyond those pumping and piping improvements the Water District, along with Jacobs Engineering of San Diego, are engaged in a full scale review of all the possible alternatives to increase our annual water supply and reliability. The district supply, with our seven reservoirs full is 78,000 acre feet of water, plus an additional 25% of water supply purchased from Sonoma. That supply has been calculated to be a 2-3 year supply of water. With the growing concerns of climate change, and the unpredictability of annual rainfall, the district has concluded that a 2-3 year supply is not enough for a secure supply. The goal of the water supply review is to consider a broad range of water alternatives, and then narrow the list to the most promising alternatives. Each of the most promising will be evaluated for performance, environmental, economic, and social criteria. We will explore strategic combinations of alternatives, perhaps ending with a portfolio of solutions as oppose to a single new water source. For example we may achieve a series of smaller projects similar to the Kastania improvements mentioned above, coupled with a larger more expansive project which might require more time to reach completion.

In late September, the district completed the eighth session of our Water Supply Assessment Workshops. At that point the list of alternatives was established, with a list of more than a dozen potential new water sources identified. It includes a more extensive Sonoma-Marin Partnership, local surface storage alternatives, water purchases with Bay interties, desalination, and recycled water projects.

We will now move forward with an evaluation of each of the selected alternatives. For example the suggested movable spillway gates on selected dams could be implemented more quickly, and with lower environmental impacts, and costs, but yield only a more moderate increase in water supply. Alternatively, desalination would produce high new water supply, but entail higher costs and environmental impacts. That analysis will continue through the evaluation process for each of the alternatives.

Based on my conversions with colleagues at Sonoma Water and North Marin Water I continue hopeful toward our existing partnership with the north bay water agencies. Together we can better use the Russian River winter flow, which appears each year during the months of October to May. That massive amount of winter water amounts to an annual 1,600,000 acre feet of water annually which flows untapped each year. For comparison purposes, that single year winter water flow equals twenty years of supply from our seven reservoirs.

With partnerships of the northern region agencies additional storage and piping to transport the water could be developed allowing us to better utilize winter water for the benefit to the entire north bay area.

restrictive covenant and strike it from the record. From then on, the deed would acknowledge that she had removed the covenant.

Lezley acknowledges that the process may not be so easy for everyone, saying that, "The million dollar question is how to help people who don't have easy access to the title report documents that point out covenants and provide guidance (books and page numbers) on how to access them at the county recorder's office." By sharing her experience in her community, in circles like the Sleepy Hollow Homeowners Association and Presbyterian Church, she has already helped to eliminate a barrier by talking to her neighbors about her experience. Some of her neighbors have already taken action to research their own properties.

Despite the fact that the covenants are no longer enforceable, Lezley recognizes the importance of removing them on principle. Lezley recounted a conversation where she was asked if she really needed to take action if the covenant had been nullified, "For me, making a moral statement is important. I want all people in this community, even in this historical nature, to know that this restrictive covenant was never OK and it is not OK to be attached to my property now. I was pleased to officially remove the roots of racism around my home. I suspect that similar restrictive covenants blanket most of the houses here," Lezley added

The Marin County Restrictive Covenant Project hopes to replicate and amplify Lezley's story through community activism. This is an unique opportunity for new and longtime residents to research and take action if necessary. Because of the time period that many Sleepy Hollow homes were built and after just the preliminary research done by the County there are many homes that have restrictive covenants remaining today. Everyone has the opportunity to make a positive and inclusive change in our neighborhood.

The Sleepy Hollow Homeowners Association partnered with Supervisor Rice's office on a high school summer internship and two amazing local high schoolers – Stella Vazquez & Tula Peltz – worked this summer to assist in researching properties. Tula is a rising sophomore at Tamalpais High School. She was interested in this project because of a documentary she did on her grandmother who worked in the Civil Rights Movement, and while learning about restrictive covenants and redlining in her English class. Stella is a rising senior at Archie Williams High School.

They are diving into research at the Recorder's office and are looking into both the Sleepy Hollow Presbyterian Church and Sleepy Hollow Community Center. 

membership to 433, including 268 Friends of the Hollow (149 prior year), and 165 residents.

Discussed:

- New ideas increase membership within Sleepy Hollow. 396 members from 833 homes is below our budget and long term goals for impact of Sleepy Hollow Community Center benefits.
- Possible need to cap pool membership and potential to increase pool membership cost. Sr 146 members (v 149), SHHA 250 (v 234).
- · Range of rates for Friends and residents.
- Potential to align membership and fiscal calendars. Consider adjusting 1 month per year for 3 years until both years are January 1 – December 31. Benefits are budgeting and monitoring progress as well as consistency with year round activity with somewhat less seasonality in the operations.

Master Plan Progress: Jan reported that construction of the emergency supplies storage building is now planned for the last week of October. GMP is \$89,000 but some contract details have not been finalized. Once started, construction expected to take up to 45 calendar days. SHCF will pay separately for interior and exterior paint/painting, lighting fixtures, and possibly sheetrock. Contract will be with Golden Bay Contractor and Jim Schalich will provide construction management as a consultant to Golden Bay. Pete gave a play area update and shared images of natural play elements that could serve age groups 2–5 and 5–12, using several separate, smaller areas of the Community Center site, instead of using the entire north lawn. Potential sites include a portion of the north lawn, the wall and adjacent space between the pool house and the pool, the space south of the new supplies building.

Nominations and Board Vacancies for 2023: Discussed expected vacancies and areas of expertise needed. President will name a Nominating Committee which will be published in the October Bulletin for reaching out to the community. We expect up to 4 vacancies and can have up to 12 total directors. Board discussed the need for better transitions for new board members to maximize value even in a first term.

Accounting Replacement: Our bookkeeper/accountant/tax preparer, Mitch Todd, is not available after the end of this year. Bryant initiated a search for potential replacements, looking first at management firms who could provide all that Mitch has done and potentially more, such as risk management. Interviews with two firms are scheduled the week of October 10, with Mitch and Jan participating.

Safe Streets: Gina reported that the cross walk and bike lane striping on Butterfield is the first phase of improvements that will continue into the county portion of Butterfield. This will include bike lane beyond Legend and a cross walk at the Sleepy Hollow Community Center. Details of both are in process, and we will see iterations of the crosswalk, which will may be able to preserve a refuge island. Bike lane just past legend to Sleepy Hollow Drive. Plan to extend the bike lane further than Sleepy Hollow Drive are deferred pending further study of parking options for large events that have relied on street parking. Reason it didn't go all the way was large scale events at Community Center. Costs and funding are incomplete.

Improved Cell Service: Pete reported there is a public appeal hearing October 25th and encourages attendance at the meeting. Time still to be confirmed.

Activities at the Community Center: Pete gave the report prepared by Community Center Manager Aya Andrews, leading with appreciation of the abundance of events and opportunities

in October, including a movie night run by the Troop 50 Boy Scouts, Ladies Bunco night, over subscribed for its first monthly night, new residents coffee and bagels social, Day of the Dead art and cooking class for kids, Ladies movie night, and Halloween pumpkin carving and movie!

Aya is experimenting with other offerings including bingo and a new parent meet-up group, an will continue experimenting to find more things that appeal to a variety of interests. Need a guys' night, order ahead or bring your own lunch bunch? Going forward, each event will also have its own announcement, to avoid anything getting lost in the long lists.

We need to schedule the annual Presidents Party, best in early December to avoid conflicts where possible.

CCTV/Surveillance project: Erik Ruud sent in a report on the search for suitable video security on the Community Center grounds. He is anxiously awaiting a quote from Microbiz on a system (may be too expensive, but useful reference point). Erik asked for the Board's ideas on coverage of the pool area, which was not part of the original thinking. Priority has been to cover bike parking areas, front of the lot, and entry gates. The Board discussed and agreed that pool coverage is not a priority at this time.

Pool Update: Dave reported that the WIFI access point at the snack bar and switch for new pool equipment will be up this weekend. Dave has also had the pool maintenance contract out for bids and will have a recommendation at the November meeting or sooner.

The meeting adjourned at 9:20 p.m. until November 3, 7:00 p.m.

Our faithful friend and partner of many years in communications to Sleepy Hollow readers of the bulletin, passed away suddenly August 22, 2022.

The <u>obituary</u> in the Marin IJ opens with "Norma was a joyful and creative person." We also knew her as patient and kind, and able to help our contributors and advertisers solve problems to get their messages across.

Her sister Linda Novy, who was with Norma as she lingered, let friends in Sleepy Hollow and Marin know. Many were able send messages, written and oral, and still others were bereft that did not know in time to do that.

Norma attended Grinnell College, Iowa and University of Iowa, earning a Bachelor of Arts degree in June 1965. Her graphic design career led her to form her own business in the late 1970s, Acorn Graphics. Her first years producing the Sleepy Hollow Bulletin were from her home in Marin, and since 2016 from her home in Medford, Oregon. Norma was so responsive and helpful, many people never realized she had moved.

433 families swam, played, cooled off, and relaxed with us this year, and more than 60 swimmers also enjoyed extended spring and fall lap swim. 2022 members will be eligible for lap swim during March. 2023 memberships will provide lap swim April and May, family swim Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend, and lap swim September and October. We are working to gage interest in water aerobics, parents and toddlers time, and other opportunities to expand pool value.

We are also working on two areas that need improvement:

- Life guard availability, especially toward the end of the summer and after high schools are back in session. This year we had a few late openings and early closings that we would like to avoid, and we were not fully prepared for the season end demands.
- Regular monitor availability for adult lap swim. The co-op system worked, but it was difficult for swimmers to be able to plan a regular schedule of swimming exercise (or meditation).

Two potential actions to strengthen Sleepy Hollow Community Pool in those areas:

- SHHA could reimburse a few interested residents or Friends of Sleepy Hollow for becoming certified in Red Cross Basic Life Saving Skills. In turn, those completing the program would agree to a number of hours (to be agreed) to life guard the pool during family swim times. Equipping interested adult residents and Friends with lifesaving skills, enabling them to:
 - extend family swim through mid-September when schools open full days
 - supplement the paid guards as needed to avoid unplanned pool closings
 - volunteer to guard lap swims or Parent/Toddler times

This training has a time commitment of about 7 hours in on line prework and 20 hours of skills training, usually over 2 or 3 days. Classes are offered at locations throughout Marin year round, or we may be able to have a class at our pool in the spring of 2023.

 SHHA could partially reimburse participants or subsidize at the Community Center the course in Red Cross First Aid with CPR and AED. Those completing the course with SHHA subsidy would volunteer to Monitor adult lap swim for an agreed number of hours at mutually agreed times in March, April, May, September, October, or be available to assist if needed during "Parent/Toddler time."
